

# OCEAN PROTECTION




The Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) Permit issued by the State Water Board, requires that the City of Manhattan Beach:

- Prevent pollutants from entering the ocean
- Collect and test water samples at outfall locations
- Report test results to the State
- Identify and implement projects to address exceedances of specified contaminants

## PROJECT TIMELINE

- 2015 Large-scale infiltration project identified within the Beach Cities Watershed Management Program
- **2020** CWE hired to perform a feasibility study aimed to locate a site suitable for infiltration
- **2021** Grant applications submitted to multiple agencies
- 2022 Design contract awarded to CWE
- **2024** CEQA Determination adopted by City Council









## PREVIOUS CITY COUNCIL ACTIONS

June 2, 2015	<b>Authorization to Submit the Draft Enhanced Watershed Management Program</b> (EWMP) to the Los Angeles Regional Water Quality Control Board (Initial concepts for a project to capture flows from the 28th St. drain included in the EWMP)

July 6, 2021	Approval of an Application for \$4,936,566 in Grant Funds from the Urban Flood Protection Grant Program

## **ALTERNATIVES**

#### **Modify Current Project**

- Relocation of project would jeopardize grant funding
- Delay of project completion would render City unable to maintain commitments to State Water Board

#### **Abandon Current Project**

- Forfeit grant funding
- Risk of penalties from Regional Water Quality Control Board
- Risk of 3<sup>rd</sup> party lawsuits
- Need to identify multiple separate projects that provide same benefit:
  - Increased costs
  - Longer time to complete projects



## RECOMMENDATIONS

Staff recommends that the City Council:

- A. Adopt Resolution No. 25-0029, approving the final construction drawings and specifications for the 28th Street Stormwater Infiltration Project and authorizing the solicitation of competitive bids for the construction of the Project; and
- B. Adopt Resolution No. 25-0030, authorizing a Use and Maintenance Agreement with the County of Los Angeles regarding a connection to the county-owned storm drain at 28th Street.
