- Whereas,* emergencies can occur at any time that require police, fire or emergency medical services in Manhattan Beach; and
- Whereas,* when an emergency occurs the prompt response of our law enforcement, fire and emergency medical personnel is critical to the protection of life and preservation of property; and
- Whereas,* the safety of our first responders is dependent upon the quality and accuracy of information obtained from citizens who call our South Bay Regional Public Communications Authority; also referred to as "RCY" for "Regional Communications Center"; and
- Whereas,* our Public Safety Communications professionals are the first and most critical contact our citizens have with emergency services; and
- Whereas,* our Public Safety Communications professionals are the single vital link for first responders by monitoring their activities by radio, providing them information, and ensuring their safety; and
- Whereas,* our Public Safety Communications professionals of Manhattan Beach have contributed substantially to the apprehension of criminals, suppression of fires and treatment of patients; and
- Whereas,* each of our Communication professionals have exhibited compassion, understanding and professionalism during the performance of their job in the past year;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved that I, Amy Thomas Howorth, Mayor of the City of Manhattan Beach, California, on behalf of the City Council and the residents of Manhattan Beach, do hereby proclaim April 12, 2026 through April 18, 2026, as
