Dear Mr. Pech:

Zusser Company, Inc. ("Zusser") provides this revised response incorporating the City's comments contained in the annotated Contractor's Statement letter. This letter supersedes and replaces our earlier submission.

RESPONSE TO QUESTION #14

(Arbitrations, claims, lawsuits, settlements within the past five years)

Zusser answered "None" to Question #14 because we understood the question to apply strictly to matters occurring within the past five years — disputes arising from conduct or violations that occurred within that timeframe.

The MWD / LADWP Lagoon Refurbishment Project classification dispute arose from events occurring between 2015 and 2017, which are more than eight years old and fall outside the five-year disclosure period. Although DIR issued its administrative decision in 2022 and the Superior Court issued its ruling in 2024, the underlying events giving rise to the dispute did not occur within the last five years.

14(b) - Summary of Parties' Claims and Defenses

DIR Position:

DIR alleged that certain workers on the 2015–2017 MWD Lagoon Refurbishment Project should have been classified as Industrial Pipefitters instead of Pipelayers, based on DIR's interpretation that lagoon drainage piping ultimately connected several miles away to a water-treatment facility.

Zusser Defense:

This was a good-faith classification disagreement. Zusser maintained:

- All workers received full prevailing wages for the Pipelayer classification.
- Work involved trenching, laying pipe, and drainage structure connections—standard Pipelayer tasks.
- Work occurred in open lagoon basins, not industrial facilities.
- Contract documents did not indicate industrial or mechanical classifications.
- The remote pipeline connection was not reasonably foreseeable to trigger Industrial Pipelitter classification.

The issue was a technical jurisdictional dispute, not wage avoidance. The Superior Court's 2024 order did not find wrongdoing, only that DLSE's interpretation would apply.

14(c) - Tribunal, Matter Number, and Outcome

Administrative Tribunal: DIR Public Works Division Case No.: 19-0134-PWH

Outcome: Civil Wage and Penalty Assessment affirmed.

Judicial Tribunal:

Los Angeles County Superior Court

Case: Zusser Company, Inc. v. Katrina S. Hagen, Director of DIR

Case No.: 22STCP03452

Outcome: Petition denied (Order dated April 2, 2024).

Why Question #14 Was Answered "None":

Zusser believed in good faith that Question #14 required disclosure of matters arising within the past five years. The underlying conduct occurred in 2015–2017, outside the required window.

RESPONSE TO QUESTION #15

(Termination of contract by owner or agency)

Zusser responded "No" because the Perris Valley Channel Sediment Removal Project was terminated for convenience, not for cause.

On June 10, 2025, the Riverside County Flood Control District executed a Termination for Convenience agreement with Zusser. The termination resulted from seasonal constraints, vegetative regrowth, changed conditions, and the District's decision to re-advertise the revised project. The District permitted Zusser to rebid, confirming no adverse responsibility finding.

Why Question #15 Was Answered "No":

Industry practice and the Questionnaire's structure indicate Question #15 refers to terminations for cause. Because this termination was for convenience only, Zusser believed "No" was the correct answer.

FINAL STATEMENT

Zusser appreciates the City's review and reaffirms:

- All answers were provided in good faith based on the five-year disclosure period.
- Legal proceedings extending into 2024 do not change the fact that the MWD matter arose from events in 2015–2017.
- The Perris Valley termination was purely for convenience.
- Zusser maintains a strong record of compliance and responsible performance.

City of MB Council Members -

I hope everyone had enough time off to enjoy Thanksgiving with family and friends. We do have so much to be thankful for.

After returning from our Thanksgiving on the east coast, I was able to review the amended 2025 12 03 City Council Regular Meeting agenda and particularly **item 9**, which is essentially staff's request for **approval on their recommended contractor selections for the 28th Street Stormwater Infiltration Project.** This project has a large cost and deserves a thorough vetting of contractors to ensure the contractor providing the best value is selected. Based on the information provided in the agenda packet I do not support approving the proposed contractors until further information is provided. Here are my specific concerns:

- 1. What is the specific request being made? The agenda item outlines the request. The PowerPoint simply jumps into the material. It would be good to be clear in the presentation.
- 2. **Primary Contractor Recommendation**: The PowerPoint implies that the contractor being recommended is based on lowest price. Although cost is a primary criteria it is not the only criteria. It is important that staff share all of

the key selection criteria and how the different contractors scored against these criteria - - even better, it would be best if the City Council could hear the recommended criteria from staff and then define the relative importance of each of those criteria. For example, the criteria might include:

- a. Cost: This needs to be the total cost for the project inclusive of bid adds to ensure that each bid received is based on the same scope of work.
- b. Warranty of services: to what extent does the contractor warrant their services and how is this warranty guaranteed.
- c. Experience/expertise in performing this scope of work:
- d. References
- e. City of MB Staff confidence in contractor's ability to work with City of MB Staff

Other criteria to consider: 1) strength of company – it is important to go with a contractor the City has confidence to perform and the contractor has not legal issues of concern, , 2) proposed staffing – has City of MB staff met the people who lead the project, are these people committed to lead the project, and does staff have confidence in their abilities, 3)

Attached is an option on how this type of contractor selection can be done. This shows the list of criteria, their relative importance (suggest staff makes a recommendation on relative importance for the city to approve), how the contractor scores against the criteria with an explanation. The total at the bottom then summarizes the information. This type of selection approach takes out the emotional side of the selection process and can include all of the critical selection criteria (not just cost).

3. Proposed contract with Zusser:

- a. Section 2.0, Scope of Services, refers to a document "28th Street Stormwater Project" which describes the scope of services. This document was not included in the agenda packet. This is the most crucial document to understand what is being contracted.
- b. Schedule did not see any schedules tied to the contract
- c. General comment: the contract shared covers only some basic items. I hope there is someone in the City independent from the negotiating team reviewing the contact to ensure it is complete and correct. Suggest this question be asked.
- 4. **Construction Management and Inspection Contractor recommendation** same comments as above for primary contractor. In addition:
 - a. No comparison of any sort of the 4 bids received. Only the comment "Transtech Engineers Best Met City's Needs." Who defined these needs and what are they?
 - b. If Transtech Engineers is or has been preferred contractor for these services how will this look to the outside world if the evaluation against the other contractors proposing is not transparent? If a key criteria is "Proven Track Record working with the City of MB" that could support the recommendation.
- 5. **City Staffing**: There is no discussion on what level of staffing is required from the City of MB. Even with a Construction Management and Inspection Contractor overseeing the project there is a clear need for City day-to-day involvement.
 - a. What is the expected City of MB involvement? Who is planned for these roles. For example, 1) City of MB contract administration, 2) Field Supervision, 3) community relations (this is an important and critical role), 4) accounting, and what/who else?
 - b. Does the city of the capacity to provide these roles?
 - c. Is this cost attributable to the overall project cost?
- 6. **Progress Reporting to City Council:** A project of this size and complexity will require periodic status reporting to the City Council. What are the expectations for this reporting? Who is responsible for preparing/presenting this? Will there be a steering committee created to oversee the project and will that committee include one or more member of the City Council?

7. Design Support Amendment

- a. Page 9 states "Includes an additional \$167,491 to complete the design phase." What has not been completed and how does that affect the scope of work the primary contractors and project management contractors bid on?
- b. The proposed addendum 2 has an additional task O(14) for Geotechnical support to "assess soil conditions and the feasibility/performance of the drywell." This appears to be a task that needs to be completed prior to starting any significant work.

c. I did not have time to go through all of the other items.

8. Contingency

- a. Page 11 shows that a 10% contingency has been included in the total cost. Is this a reasonable % to have at this time? What has the city experienced in past projects for cost overruns, scope expansion, etc.?
- b. Page 11 includes contingency for the Primary Contractor only. Contingency needs to be applied to all of the cost components (primary contractor, construction management, and design). If city staff time is included in the budget then contingency needs to be included for staff time.

9. Project Budget:

- a. Does page 11 include all costs attributable to the project? i.e., is City of MB staff time overseeing the project included, are design costs to date included?
- b. The total projected cost with the proposed contractors comes under the Total Available Funds. That would be great if the project is executed to the projected cost. What happens if the cost does go over the Total Available Funds?

I look forward to the discussion Tuesday evening.



I am concerned that Zusser may have lied on their application about not having any litigation. Case No. 19-0134-PWH(Civil Wage and Penalty Assessment – LADWP Lagoon Refurbishment Project). DIR's Division of Labor Standards Enforcement audited Zusser's work on a public-works job (the LADWP lagoon refurbishment for Metropolitan Water District), found underpayment/misclassification, and issued a Civil Wage and Penalty Assessment. After review, the DIR Director: 1) Found unpaid wages of \$171,476.08 and unpaid training contributions of \$1,725.32 2) Imposed various statutory penalties and liquidated damages 3) For a total of \$653,177.48 owed, plus interest. The case was opened March 11, 2019 (assessment issued) and decided August 18, 2022, prior to their application being submitted to MB.

Dear Honorable Mayor and Council Members,

On behalf of the Surfrider Foundation South Bay Chapter, we are writing to express our strong and continued support for the City of Manhattan Beach's 28th Street Stormwater Infiltration Project.

As a grassroots nonprofit dedicated to the protection and enjoyment of the world's oceans, waves, and beaches, Surfrider South Bay actively advocates for solutions that improve local water quality, enhance coastal resilience, and protect community health. The proposed stormwater infiltration system aligns directly with these goals by capturing and treating 60% of the city's urban runoff before it reaches the beach and ocean — reducing pollution and supporting compliance with regional water quality standards.




Figure 1. Concentration of *Enterococcus* bacteria (MPN/100mL) found in water samples collected in Manhattan Beach, 27th Street. The yellow dotted line indicates medium bacteria levels (36-104 MPN/100mL) and the red dotted line indicates high bacteria levels (> 104 MPN/100mL) as set by the California State Water Resources Control Board.

Our chapter's volunteer-led, middle and high school student-run Teach & Test Blue Water Task Force program regularly monitors *Enterococcus* bacteria levels at South Bay beaches. Data from our sampling sites, including Manhattan Beach at 27th Street, show that high bacteria levels are associated with stormwater runoff, conditions that can put children, families, and other beachgoers at increased risk of illness (Figure 1). Our chapter's beach cleanup program similarly collects hundreds of pounds of trash off South Bay beaches each year, underscoring the need for systemic pollution prevention efforts.

In addition to its intrinsic community and ecological benefits, the project will help the City meet Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) waste load allocations for trash, debris, and bacteria as required by the Los Angeles Regional Water Quality Control Board. Meeting these targets is critical for improving coastal water quality and protecting public health—key outcomes that align with Surfrider's vision of ensuring all coastal waters are safe for recreation without risk of illness or infection.

We commend the City for its leadership in prioritizing stormwater infrastructure projects that safeguard our coast. The 28th Street Stormwater Infiltration Project represents a necessary investment in cleaner water and healthier beaches in Manhattan Beach.
