on August 25, 2021, at 3:34 A.M., Officers Michael Lynch, Arai White and Michael Trani responded to a call for service. A citizen called 911 reporting they saw a male subject running from a nearby backyard and then heard a female screaming; and

upon arrival at the location, Officer Lynch began checking the area for anything suspicious. He and the other officers did not see or hear anything out of the ordinary, and could have cleared the call with an incident note, "unable to locate anything suspicious in the area"; and

Officer Lynch did not clear the call and continued investigating. He reviewed surveillance video which showed a male entering an apartment in the 200 block of 39th Street in El Porto and located a potential witness who informed Officer Lynch that a young female lived alone in that apartment; and

Officer Lynch conducted a security check at the apartment to check on the female's well being. After knocking on the front door, Officer Lynch heard a male's voice inside who threatened to kill himself with a knife he had in his hand;

Officer Lynch was now dealing with someone armed with a knife, possibly mentally unstable, and there may be a possible female hostage inside the apartment. Officer Lynch, an MBPD SWAT Officer, utilized his training and maintained a dialogue with the suspect through the closed door while coordinating a tactical response with other responding officers; and

as Officers White and Trani arrived, Officer Lynch continued to talk with the suspect and convinced him to unlock and open the front door. He was able to get the suspect to put the knife down and persuaded him to step out of the apartment. At the same time, Officer White was standing next to the open door and put the suspect in handcuffs without any force. With the suspect detained, Officers Lynch and Trani quickly conducted a safety sweep of the apartment; and

inside the master bedroom, the officers located the young female who was struggling to breathe. Her labored gasps and marks on her neck indicated she had been violently strangled. The victim was taken to the hospital in critical condition and spent several days recovering there from the brutal attack; and

Officer Lynch's actions and thorough investigation interrupted and prevented a homicide. His careful dialogue with the suspect kept him from hurting himself or returning to kill the victim. He effectively negotiated with a homicidal suspect, which diminished the need for lethal confrontation. Officer Lynch developed enough rapport with the suspect that he voluntarily surrendered; and

Officers Trani and White's actions at the scene took this dangerous and violent suspect into custody, then located the nearly unconscious and dying victim with just enough time to save her life; and

the actions of these officers undoubtedly saved the victim's life and went above the normal call of duty.


Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved that the City Council, on behalf of the residents and citizens of the City of Manhattan Beach, California, does hereby award this commendation to


