PUBLIC ALERTS AND WARNINGS GUIDE

The City of Manhattan Beach is committed to providing timely, accurate, and actionable information to protect life, property, and the environment during emergencies. An effective alert and warning system is a critical component of the City's overall emergency management and public safety strategy.

This Alert and Warning Guide outlines how the City disseminates emergency information to residents, businesses, visitors, and partner agencies before, during, and after an incident. It describes the methods used to notify the public, the types of alerts that may be issued, and the actions individuals should take upon receiving an alert or warning.

Manhattan Beach utilizes multiple communication platforms, including regional emergency notification systems, to ensure information is delivered as quickly and broadly as possible. These systems are used to communicate a wide range of hazards, including but not limited to earthquakes, tsunamis, severe weather, hazardous materials incidents, and other threats to public safety.

Residents and community members are encouraged to familiarize themselves with this guide, make arrangements for emergencies, and register for official emergency alerts. Public preparedness and awareness, combined with coordinated emergency response efforts, strengthen the City's ability to respond effectively and enhance community resilience during emergencies.



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What are Public Warning, Alerts, Orders, and Notifications?

HOW TO ISSUE ALERTS AND WARNINGS

To ensure an effective alert and warning program, a jurisdiction should closely coordinate and collaborate with all public safety agencies within the jurisdiction and neighboring communities to develop a shared understanding of the local alert and warning plan prior to an incident and coordinate and collaborate on specific alert and warning actions taken during an incident. To the best extent possible, warning messages should be distributed to all members of the communities who are at risk, including commuters, travelers and transient populations, people with disabilities and access or functional needs, non-English speakers, people in remote or isolated areas, older adults, people with limited technology, etc.

California Standard Statewide Evacuation Terminology

EVACUATION WARNING: Potential threat to life and/or property. Gather any important paperwork, medication, or essential needs. Those who require additional time to evacuate, including individuals with access or functional needs, and those with pets and livestock, should leave now.

EVACUATION ORDER: Immediate threat to life. This is a lawful order to leave now. The area is lawfully closed to public access. Failure to follow an evacuation order may endanger your life and the lives of others and may result in injury or death. Once you have left the area, you will not be able to return until local authorities lift the evacuation order.

SHELTER IN PLACE: Go indoors. Shut and lock doors and windows. Prepare to self-sustain until further notice and/or contacted by emergency personnel for additional directions. Chemical, biological, or radiological contaminants may be released accidentally or intentionally into the environment. Should this occur, information will be provided by local authorities on television and radio stations on how to protect you and your family.

EVACUATION ORDER(S) LIFTED: The formal announcement of lifting evacuations in an area currently under evacuation.

HARD CLOSURE: Closed to all traffic except Fire and Law Enforcement.

SOFT CLOSURE: Closed to all traffic except Fire, Law Enforcement, and critical Incident resources (i.e., utility, Caltrans, City/County Roads, etc., or those needed to repair or restore infrastructure).

Types of Communication

ALERT SOUTHBAY

The City of Manhattan Beach has enhanced our emergency communication platform by partnering Alert SouthBay. Alert SouthBay is a regional integration notification platform with 15 cities in the South Bay that allows you to opt-in to receive notifications via phone calls, text messaging, e-mail, and more based on locations you care about. You can choose to receive notifications about events that may affect your home, workplace, family, schools, and more. The notification system gives the Police, Fire, Emergency Management, and specific contract



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cities the ability to deliver critical notifications to our community. The *Alert SouthBay* notification system replaces all existing notification systems, including NIXLE.

GENASYS

Genasys Protect is a mobile and web-based public safety platform that delivers real-time emergency information. It provides map-based awareness and location-specific updates to help communities stay safe.

TRAINING	Dark Green		Emergency personnel training. No response necessary from residents. (Can also be used for virtual evacuations, such as when testing the Community Warning Systems.)



INTEGRATED PUBLIC ALERT AND WARNING SYSTEM (IPAWS)

IPAWS is a federally-managed system operated by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) that enables authorized government officials to send emergency alerts through multiple channels, including: These alerts may only be issued by specifically authorized users who have submitted a written request outlining the justification and need for access. The user must also hold current FEMA certificates for the required training courses and have completed all initial onboarding requirements. Users must contact the on-call Duty Officer with Alert SouthBay to gain authorization to send the alert.

EMERGENCY ALERT SYSTEM (EAS)

The Emergency Alert System (EAS) is a national public warning system that requires TV and radio broadcasters, cable television systems, wireless cable systems, satellite digital audio radio service providers, direct broadcast satellite service providers, and wireline video service providers to offer the President of the United States the communications capability to address the American public during a national emergency. EAS can also be used by state and local authorities to deliver important emergency information such as AMBER Alerts (for missing children), SILVER Alerts (for missing seniors), and emergency weather information targeted to specific areas.

WIRELESS EMERGENCY ALERT (WEA)

WEA gives authorized government alerting authorities the ability to send emergency messages through major mobile carriers. Authorities can send WEA alerts to people in specific areas. Everyone in the target area will receive the message on his or her mobile device (i.e., cell phone). WEA alerts look different from a typical text alert to differentiate them from regular notifications. They cause a unique alert tone and vibration, accompanied by a brief text notification displayed on the recipient's mobile device. The public does not need to register for this service. WEA is an opt-out system. Mobile device users will receive the WEA notification unless they choose to deactivate the service on their mobile device.



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SOCIAL MEDIA

Communications is a vital component of our City. We invite open dialogue between our residents, businesses, community organizations, and the City in hopes of inspiring our residents and community partners to further become involved in Manhattan Beach. We strive to keep our residents informed on the projects that affect their taxes and their lives, disseminate information during emergencies, and promote Manhattan Beach as a California beach town with a laid-back, classic, upscale, and family-friendly lifestyle.

Fortunately, technology gives our City a multitude of ways to communicate. Print, television, website, email, social media, text, and e-alerts are all communication channels we utilize to communicate with our residents, businesses, community organizations, and visitors.

ELECTRONIC CHANGEABLE MESSAGE SIGNS (CMS)

The City has portable electronic changeable message signs that can be deployed throughout Manhattan Beach to warn motorists and pedestrians of hazards, road closures, evacuation routes, and other emergency information. These signs are particularly effective for reaching people traveling through the community who may not be registered for other alert systems.

PUBLIC ADDRESS SYSTEMS AND EMERGENCY VEHICLE SIRENS

Manhattan Beach Police and Fire Department vehicles are equipped with public address systems and sirens that can be used to issue warnings and instructions during widespread emergencies. This method is particularly effective for evacuation orders, hazardous materials incidents, and situations requiring immediate protective action from residents in specific areas.



Additional Tools

SHAKE ALERT

Earthquake Early Warning Receive timely, potentially life-saving early warning alerts in California, Oregon and Washington. MyShake uses the USGS ShakeAlert (earthquake.usgs.gov/data/shakealert/) system to deliver alerts for earthquakes of magnitude 4.5 (or greater) several seconds before shaking arrives.

NATIONAL OCEANOGRAPHIC AND ATMOSPHERIC ADMINISTRATION (NOAA) WEATHER RADIO

NOAA Weather Radio All Hazards (NWR) is a nationwide network of radio stations broadcasting continuous weather information directly from the nearest National Weather Service office. NWR broadcasts official Weather Service warnings, watches, forecasts and other hazard information 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

SOUTH COAST AQMD

South Coast AQMD is responsible for controlling emissions primarily from stationary sources of air pollution. These can include anything from large power plants and refineries to the corner gas station. There are about 25,500 such businesses operating under South Coast AQMD permits. Many consumer products also cause air emissions; these include house paint, furniture varnish, and thousands of products containing solvents that evaporate into the air.
